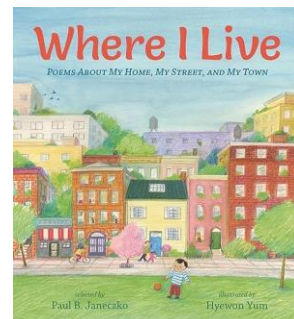

Discussion Questions

HOME Chapter

HOME by X.J. Kennedy

1. "...any old place that's your home base is where you want to be." What makes a place feel like "home base" to you? Is it a room, an apartment/house, certain people, something else? Is "home base" the same or different on the weekends? Why?

2. Who is the "breakfast boss?" Where does she live and why does she ring the doorbell? Does someone help you with your breakfast on school days, or do you make it yourself? On school days, what do you usually have for breakfast? What are your favorite breakfast foods?

3. Why does the person in the poem go up to the rooftop? Do you have a place where you can "feel free"? Where is it and what does it look like? What do you do there? Do you share it with someone else?

Describe three different surfaces they walked on. Describe three different ways they moved. Where do they usually go on Saturday or Sunday?
